Fellowship growth and global impact

Fellowship remains a pinnacle of professional recognition. At the Annual General Meeting in October 2024, we were proud to welcome **63 new Fellows** — including:






Membership growth





Professional development

SHAPE – Society for Health Administration Programs in Education

Hong Kong College of Health Service Executives has continued to be an Affiliate Member of the Society for Health Administration Programs in Education (SHAPE), in which Dr. Arthur SHAM represents the College as liaison person. The International Health Conference was held on 8-9 July 2024 in Hong Kong and online. The theme of the Conference was "Healthcare system sustainability: Implications for healthcare management, education and research." TREASURER

On behalf of the Board, I am pleased to present the financial report for the year ended 30 June 2025. We have delivered an operating surplus of \$237,003 from a turnover of \$4.1m.

We are thankful for our members' unwavering support, which has allowed us to maintain steady revenue from membership fees [\$713,230 in FY25 and \$692,871 in FY24].

Other key highlights include:

- 1. The Annual Asia Pacific Leadership Congress event was held in Brisbane, generating a revenue of \$859k and a surplus of \$323k. The event attracted 666 registrations, well above our forecast figures.
- 2. In March 2025, 210 health management professionals attended the One-Day Health Leadership Conference in Melbourne, resulting in a surplus of over \$50k.
- 3. In May 2025, the WA Branch organised the well-received and prosperous yearly State Leadership Conference. The event drew over 460 healthcare leaders and executives and resulted in a surplus of \$133k.

- 4. ACHSM continues to improve its online education program and provide members with informative webcasts on various topics of interest. ACHSM's income from professional education activities has been on a steady rise, reaching \$773K in the current fiscal year, slightly down from \$788K in FY24.
- 5. In FY25, there was decrease in sponsorship revenue for the branches from \$237K in FY24 to \$199K, Annual Congress sponsorship increased from \$157K in FY24 to \$227K in FY25. We want to express our gratitude to our financial and in-kind sponsors, as their continued support enables ACHSM to enhance its capabilities in developing and providing affordable professional development and learning opportunities for our members.
- 6. Our overall expenditure rose by 9.8% compared to FY24 mainly due to another new Cohort for the WACHS Leads Program.
- 7. In FY25, we established a further three term deposits for various periods and earned an interest income of \$108k.
- 8. In FY24, grant funding from the Victoria Department of Health ceased. The final \$81k of funding has been utilised for Rural Placements.

A summary of the financial results includes:

- 96% (95% FY24) of revenue is derived from:
 - Professional Development Events \$773k
 (\$788k FY24)
 - Trainee Management Programs \$1,561k
 (\$1,236k FY24)
 - Program Grants \$81k (\$81k FY24)
 - Annual Congress \$859k (\$592k FY24)
 - Membership Fees \$713k (\$692k FY24)

The results compared favourably to budget.

- 98% (97% FY24) of expenditure was incurred from:
 - Employee Benefits \$1,185k (\$1,083k FY24)
 - O Administration Expenses \$476k (\$415k FY24)
 - Professional Development Expenses \$346k (\$345k FY24)
 - Annual Congress Expenses \$536k (\$397k FY24)
 - Trainee Management Program \$1,308k (\$1,192k FY24)
